On Christmas Eve, in England, children wait for Santa's arrival as in Italy, but the tradition of sending letters is different. While in Italy we send them to the North Pole (at least theoretically), English children burn them in the fireplace. According to the legend, Father Christmas is able to read the chimney smoke, so he can understand all the children's requests.

Furthermore, in Great Britain there is no a proper Christmas Eve dinner, but people like going to pubs or to midnight church services or singing Christmas carols outside.
